How to cite your sources in APA style (7th Edition)

The American Psychological Association has established a set of norms for the sharing of research. Their approach has been adopted by several VIU faculties. So if you are using APA style, when you present information from your sources (whether their actual writing or summaries/paraphrases of their ideas) you should use this approach to tell your reader where it came from (i.e. to cite your sources). It is an **in-text citation** system, which means that you must include a minimal citation in your text next to the cited material (rather than a number leading to a foot/endnote). This in-text citation takes the form, typically, of **author surname** plus **date**, which is just enough to take your reader to the full entry in your **References** list at the end of your paper. Include a **page number** for material that has a specific location in the source text (as a quotation always will have). For example, **APA citation is very straightforward (Hill, 2017)**. OR you can use the name in a signal phrase, like this: **According to Hill (2017), APA citation is very straightforward**. If it was a quotation rather than a paraphrase we would use quotation marks and give a page number: **"The citation style developed by the American Psychological Association, although thorough and sophisticated in its approach, is, to the average user, very simple to put into effect" (Hill, 2017, p. 44)**. The entry in your References list varies according to type of object being cited, but basically it requires these four elements:

1. **Who** is responsible for it? (usually the author) 2. **When** was it published? (usually the year) 3. **What** is it? (usually the title, PLUS the title of anything it is contained in, like an article *in* a journal) 4. **Where** can I find it? Usually publication details for book, or web location data for a digital source.

So, to use the table below, identify what kind of thing you have (book, journal, DVD) etc, and find it in the left-hand column. Look in the right-hand column for the reference entry and the in-text citation.

Secondary source--material cited in a study you read, but you didn't read the original. You <i>should</i> read the original if possible, so use 2ndary sources minimally. Name the original source in your text (plus date, if available), but cite the 2ndary source, which is the only thing that appears in your references list.	Berg, B.L. (2007). <i>Qualitative research methods for the social sciences</i> (6 th ed.). Pearson. In-text citation In Smith and Wang's 1995 study, “quantity was found to have its own quality” (as cited in Berg, 2007, p.54).

On the last page, **all references must be listed alphabetically** by author's surname (or whatever element you choose to place first in your reference entry) under the heading, "**References**" (bold and centred). Double-space the entries and use a half-inch (1.27 cm) “hanging indent” (Word will do this for you – expand “paragraph” menu on “home” tab, and select “special,” then “hanging.”)
